RECREATION & CONSERVATION

In June, members of the Michigan Outdoor Recreation Advisory Council (ORAC) spent the day in Midland to learn from various perspectives in the outdoor recreation consumer cycle. After visiting Scientific Anglers and Little Forks Outfitters, our executive director Greg Yankee welcomed the members at our Averill Preserve.

Greg presented an overview of the organization and the vital connection between conservation and outdoor recreation; how protecting our land and water is invaluable and necessary for the industry and overall impact of our economy.

A staff led tour proceeded after the presentation - highlighting Averill's accessible trail, nature play area, educational signage and rustic trails. The council finished their Midland tour after visiting Chippewa Nature Center and holding their quarterly meeting.

Last year, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the Michigan Natural Resources Commission announced the formation of this advisory body to identify new collaborative opportunities and further broaden the base of support for outdoor recreation and natural resource stewardship within the state.

The Michigan ORAC is composed of leaders in Michigan's outdoor recreation industry, reflecting the manufacturing, retail and service sectors, as well as employers in health, community finance and other leading industries. Many of our supporters may recognize two of the council members: Bo Brines, owner of Little Forks Outfitters, and Jonathan Jarosz, executive director of Heart of the Lakes.

More recently, Governor Whitmer annouced the creation of an Office of Outdoor Recreation and Brad Garmon as the office's executive director.





This summer, the Midland Country Club hosted the first Dow Great Lakes Bay Invitational. Dow, along with other sponsors, partnered with Little Forks and 35 other nonprofits, to team up with the world's leading professional female golfers for the Ladies Professional Golfing Association Tour! The 72 teams competing were divided up into four focus areas: STEM, Sustainability, Inclusion, and Innovation. Promoting sustainability, Little Forks' first team included Michigan native, Elayna Bowser & recent Midland transplant, Chaithra Katamneni!. Our second team included Jenny Shin who has 1 career LPGA win, and Na Yeon Choi who has 9 career LPGA wins.

Both teams performed incredibly and showed real initiative in promoting sustainability in the Great Lakes Bay Region. The Midland Country Club will host the GLBI and LPGA again next year -- July 13 - 18, 2020!



OUTdoors Together was started in June of 2019, and has been a resounding success! Often, marginalized communities have trouble feeling safe in the woods. Andrea Foster created a program for LGBTQIA+ individuals and allies to come together, and enjoy a nature hike or outdoor excursion.

Family friendly and free of cost, over the summer Little Forks hosted six different hikes at both the Little Forks preserves and the Midland City Forest. Support from organizations like Dow's GLAD and Perceptions has been monumental, as the information to attend was included in their newsletters and e-news. Volunteers have helped lend educational help, and groups ranging from five to thirty people have joined Andrea for a walk in the woods, rain or shine! Two fall hikes have been

or shine! Two fall hikes have been announced, and the winter season will hopefully lend opportunities to take the group snowshoeing.

Routine hikes will start again in the spring, and Little Forks will continue to look for ways to fill gaps in the community when it comes to nature and the outdoors!

CEDAR RIVER CLEANUP

On July 11th The Little Forks Conservancy and the Gladwin Conservation District hosted the 5th annual cleanup of the Cedar River in Gladwin, which was a huge

success! Thirtytwo volunteers helped us clean the 4.5 mile stretch of river from Chappel Dam to Gladwin City Park.

In addition to the volunteers, local organizations really helped

make this event a success with kayaks donated by Ike's Mobile Kayaks and transportation provided by Gladwin City-County Transit. The Boardman River Clean Sweep group from Traverse City who coordinated the event in its first few years were also a tremendous help, bringing volunteers, extra supplies, and years



of experience to help guide the group. Supplies were also purchased using a VRSCCP grant awarded to the conservation district by the Great Lakes Commission.

In the end, 305

pounds of trash were removed from the river, helping to protect this high quality waterway.

As part of a larger project to improve the trails at Riverview Natural Area, two large boardwalks were built this summer in the northern section beyond the stairway. Each boardwalk is about 238 feet, using a simple design of 4 inch by 6 inch lumber supports and 2 inch by 10 inch platforms that rest on the ground, providing a hard surface above the standing water in the spring time for hikers to easily navigate this beautiful area.

The first boardwalk was built and paid for by Trinseo, as part of their 2019 Volunteer Days coordinated by Trinseo and United Way of Midland. These dedicated volunteers took a four day project and completed it in just two days, contributing 104 volunteer hours! The second boardwalk was built by Little Forks volunteers a few weeks later. This project was accomplished thanks to funding by Lowe's Small Community Grant and an action grant from Saginaw Bay Watershed Initiative Network.

In addition to boardwalks, the trail has been diverted in many areas to opt for drier land. Once this project is complete, there will be 3 miles of sustainable trail at Riverview Natural Area making it great for day hikes. To make the Natural Area more user friendly, additional signage can be found at the parking lot area; covering the do's and don'ts, a trail blaze key, invasive species and coming soon an updated trail map!


BUILDING ACCESS FOR ALL

OLUNTEER HIGHLIGHT

Trinseo funded and built 238 feet of boardwalk at Riverview Natural Area; completing 104 volunteer hours. This was part of a larger project to improve Riverview, where funding from Lowe's and Saginaw Bay WIN allowed for another 238 feet of boardwalk to be built, new signage at the parking area and 0.5 miles of trail to be built. Halfway through this project and together we completed 44 volunteer hours!

Other volunteer work in the nature preserves and Cedar River in 2019 has reached 350 hours, so far!
