Applications are being processed for a half-term AmeriCorps member to assist with land priorities this upcoming field season.




FISHERMAN'S PATH AT LANE

On a chilly morning in September, Sara our preserves & volunteers manager and Shelby our previous Huron Pines AmeriCorps member met up with Little Forks and Leon P. Martuch Chapter of Trout Unlimited volunteers to work together on building a path at Little Forks' Lane Preserve, from M-18 to the Cedar River.

The area consisted of a steep hill to one side and a wetland to the other. The group worked to cut into the side of the hill a level single-track trail allowing those who fish to access the river. The trail is about a quartermile long and allows users to enter and fish roughly a half-mile section of the stream.

Additional fishing access points have been identified and the trail to the south is still in development, but should be finished this season. These access points are rustic and not well defined yet, So if you decide to venture out on them, please use caution. You can find the trail map on the Lane Preserve's page of our website.

Little Forks invites you to be a part of our Cedar River Stream Sampling Event on Saturday, May 15th at 10am. We will be taking samples of macroinvertebrates that live in the river to determine the water quality using a biodiversity index.

Each team consists of a trained Team Leader, a collector that stays in the water, a runner, and pickers that hunt for and pick the living macroinvertebrates from trays. LITTLE FORKS GIVES BIG THANKS!

After the flood in May of 2020, Forestview Natural Area experienced a great deal of damage. The main trail is a 1.3 mile loop that includes a bridge at the halfway point. This bridge was lifted from its position over a creek and destroyed - resulting in unsafe passage to the second half of the property. In addition, the outer banks of the natural area were littered with large structural debris such as docks, a small water craft, tires, and other unusual items. Forestview was closed for a number of months as staff assessed the damage and began disassembly of the bridge.

The AmeriCorps program through Gaylord-based Huron Pines selected Forestview as their project for their annual Day of Giving, a day dedicated to giving back to the community. Little Forks received help from about 13 AmeriCorps members along with staff fromHuron Pines, Chippewa Nature Center, Michigan United Conservation Clubs, and the U.S. Forest Service! The team of AmeriCorps members assisted Little Forks' staff with building a new bridge and removed more than a dumpster's worth of debris. Thanks to help of these incredible individuals, Little Forks was able to reopen Forestview shortly after, allowing the public to once again recreate in this beautiful habitat safely.

LOOKING BACK ON 25 YEARS

Twenty-five years ago in 1996, a small group of conservation-minded citizens in Midland banded together to permanently impact the community in the best way they could think of; by starting the area's first and only land trust.

Born out of a determination to ensure that parts of the Tittabawassee and Chippewa River watershed systems were protected from development, Little Forks Conservancy's first board was comprised of individuals whom to this day continue to help the conservancy serve the original mission of preserving and protecting Mid-Michigan's natural habitats.

Since then, Little Forks has added over thirty easements and six preserves. Conservation easement lands remain in private ownership with the conservation values protected by Little Forks, while five of the six preserves owned by Little Forks Conservancy are open to the public. In addition to protecting over 3,800 acres of land, twenty miles of shoreline and providing over ten miles of trails, the conservancy has grown to embrace all aspects of conservation. Along with the completion of its first ADA-accessible trail, Little Forks has pioneered programming that stewards the notion that nature is for EVERYONE.

In the last twenty-five years, Little Forks Conservancy has seen a lot of change. The first executive director Doug Koop served the organization for twenty of those years, with a small but dedicated staff and hundreds of volunteers who have poured their efforts into building and growing the non-profit. Greg Yankee took over after that, navigating two floods and fostering the growth of an evolved mission.

Our interim director Elan Lipschitz has poured over twenty years of hard work into creating an easement program that gives landowners the peace of mind that only 'forever' can bring. Director of programs & partnerships Andrea Foster has put the organization on the map as a trailblazer of outdoor diversity and inclusion efforts. Sara Huetteman, preserves & volunteers manager, tirelessly manages volunteers who help her improve our natural areas that the public have come to love so dearly. Our outreach coordinator Alyssa Walters has been instrumental in keeping outreach and communications like the one you are reading beautiful, accurate and inviting to all. Armed with tenacity, grit, and a team that lives to serve, today the organization excitedly anticipates the next chapter in leadership of what has become a beloved community organization.

Looking forward, Little Forks Conservancy will continue doing what it always has. "In Perpetuity" (conservation's favorite word) means that this work will be done forever, by protecting and preserving our region's beautiful habitats and sanctuaries. We will always strive to do more, to be better, and to provide safe, managed spaces that invite in all those who seek to spend time amongst the wild. We will bring knowledge to the community, and educate those who wish to learn. Most importantly, we will never give up. With your help, we will grow and continue to provide what we can; to the earth, to the wildlife, and to you, our faithful and generous supporters.
