

Watch for Pesky Plants

Managing invasive plants and identifying alternatives



What are invasive plants?

Invasive species are plants that are not native to our region and have a tendency to grow aggressively. They have been taken from their native environments and introduced to ours by both humans and wildlife. Invasive species take over and make it hard or impossible for native plants to grow and thrive.

Why should I control invasive plants?

When you take action against them, you are helping keep them in check. You are also helping save wildlife. Some invasive plants eradicate native plant species that serve as vital food sources to birds, bees, and small animals.

What should I plant instead of invasive and exotic species?

Native plant species are great! They are best adapted to our region, requiring less water and care than most exotic species. Not sure where to buy native plants? Call our office or visit our website for a list of native plant sellers.

How can I get rid of them?

Depending on the plant, there are many methods you can try:

- Hand pulling – Pull plants at the base, so the roots come up with it.
- Mechanical Pulling – Use Weed Wrenches or pry bars to pull tougher invasive plants from the ground.
- Cut Stump – Cut the plant or tree at the base, and then spot treat it with an herbicide. This will kill the plant without harming nearby plants.

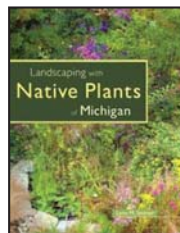

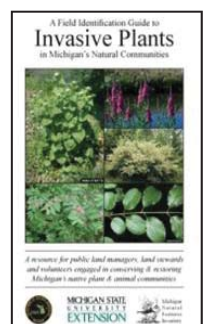
Landscaping with Native Plants of Michigan
