Thanks to members like you, Little Forks will break ground on our Averill Access for All project soon!

Little Forks Conservancy will break ground on our first accessible trail as soon as this spring!

Thanks to generous donations by members like you, Little Forks has reached our initial fundraising goal! The final fundraising goal will be determined by the bids for construction.

"The way that our community has rallied around this project is so inspiring," said Board President Jon DeGroot. "I'd especially like to thank Dave & Patti Kepler, who championed this project from the very beginning."

Little Forks announced the Averill Preserve Access for All Project last summer.

Through this project, the decade-old crushed stone at the overlook will be replaced with asphalt. A new concrete viewing area will provide an exceptional view of the Tittabawassee River.

Little Forks' first accessible trail will lead visitors from the overlook into the preserve. Inside the trail loop will be a nature play area.

"The play area will be a place where kids can use nature to feed their imaginations," said

Executive Director Greg Yankee. "We don't want to define how they play."

New directional and interpretive signage will be placed along the trail. Little Forks is also looking at other ways of interpreting the property for all ages and abilities.

"When completed, everyone – from people with wheelchairs to families with strollers – will be able to explore this beautiful property," said Greg. "We can't wait to share this preserve with them."

The Averill Preserve Access for All project is several things: it is a real, physical project with blueprints, engineering reports, and – of course – budgets; it is also a message that we are committed to making our work accessible for more members of the community who want to enjoy time in nature.

Perhaps most importantly, it is a symbol of an ethic that pervades the work of The Little Forks Conservancy: if our work is only valued by our staff, board, and donors, then we will fall well short of our goal that it survives for generation upon generation.

Make no mistake: our work will always have as its backbone the natural resources of mid-Michigan. The rivers, lakes, forests, and fields

that make this a wonderful place to call home are why we all are excited to head into work each day. But these natural resources do not exist in a vacuum.

They have intrinsic ecological value, but they also have tremendous social value.
